This year began later in August than usual, giving students a lengthy, restful break before returning to school. As the Class of 2026 has been getting settled in, the Class of 2023 has been antsy to get out. With college decisions coming in and being made it has been hard for many seniors to stay focused on their current work days. But within this first semester of the 2022-2023 school year, many moments have been worth staying focused on.

For a few years now Mayfield has had a new learning environment, the Option Program. It's available to students to provide them with a completely self-paced learning experience in order to accommodate those who learn better with more freedom. Previously this had only been available to 11th-12th grade students, but with the new installment of the upstairs level option space, the Option Program is now available to 9th-10th grade students as well. This new way of learning has been working well according to our principal, Mr. Jeff Legan. He spoke about the option stating, "The 9th-12th grade Option modality is working based on the data that I have collected. The data not only measures the academic success of our students but also the social skills that we had originally hoped to develop. These social skills are vital to the success of our students while they are in high school and beyond." Along with the Option, Mr. Legan and his Principal's Advisory Committee of students continues to develop ideas involving new courses that could be moved from a traditional learning setup to a self-paced one. It has become a goal at Mayfield to account for all learning styles.

Mayfield's football team had a successful season this fall under **Coach Ross Bandiera's** leadership. The Cats made it to the playoffs, but unfortunately lost their final game against Austintown-Fitch. The Wildcats were supported through some tough losses, but celebrated through many wins as well with their 6-5 record this year. The student section was filled with school spirit as everyone followed weekly themes to show their support for the team and the school. Half-time performances from our band were full of energy each night as they lived up to their name, The Pride of Mayfield, under the directorship of **Mr. Brad Treiber.**

Sadly, the hardest loss was 14-58 at the Homecoming game against a very powerful Riverside team. Despite a loss on the football field, Mayfield hosted a magical Wizard of Oz-themed Homecoming to celebrate coming back together this school year. Starting off with our Homecoming assembly, the students enjoyed the decorations, complete with cutouts of Dorothy and the others, courtesy of our wonderful student council. New to this year, our assembly was accompanied by our band and cheerleaders to get everyone ramped full of energy for the dance. The Sweet Sixteen tradition continued. Our nominated 16 girls and 16 boys showed off their moves in front of the energetic student body. After everyone had their moment in the spotlight, our crowned King and Queen were announced, Gigi Raguz and Stratos Hiliatzos. This atmosphere carried into our Homecoming dance that following Saturday night.

The beautiful talents of Mayfield's Theater Department were put on display this year with their performance of **A Chorus Line, Teen Edition,** which follows 32 aspiring Broadway performers as they audition for a part in the chorus line, sharing their personalities and experiences along the way. The Alumni Coordinator Position Allowed Us To Expand Our Horizons

Many members of the Mayfield Alumni Association have asked detailed questions regarding several aspects of our organization. The Executive Board has decided to highlight many of the topics that have been submitted. This is the second in a series of historical articles that will appear in *The Alumni Voice Newsletter*.

Looking Back.....

As we stated in the previous newsletter, the Mayfield Alumni Association was created in 1980. We established an Executive Board to handle all the events and activities of the Association. Like most new organizations, we grew steadily over the first 10 years behind the capable volunteer work of our Board members. And then something unsavory happened. Our Alumni Association got a little stale. We offered the same events and services each year that we previously offered. Something was wrong and the Board didn't feel very good about it. Members of our Board were all volunteers, of course. Everybody gave of their time willingly, but to a person, we all wanted to do more for the Association. As good as we were, we wanted to be bigger, faster, and stronger. So, we were at a crossroads of sorts.

Then we got the idea to create a new Board position and we titled it **Alumni Coordinator.** But we didn't want to just add another person who would also give of his/her time freely and risk burning out. We wanted to put some teeth into this position. Our expectations were much higher than "volunteerism." The Association didn't have much money at the time, but we decided if we truly wanted to expand our horizons, we would have to create a paid position. Of course, we would also have to fund this position if we wanted it to succeed. And, boy, did it ever!

Our first goal was to find the right person for the job , then put the Alumni Coordinator in position to succeed. Our second task was to create a job description. After all, we created this position, one that no other alumni association nor school support group had, to take the burden off the other Board members who continued to volunteer their time. The job description was very thorough and has been greatly expanded since it's inception. Our purpose in creating the position of Alumni Coordinator was to do much of the heave lifting of our committee chairs. So the Alumni Coordinator became the focal point of every committee we had, doing things that the committee chair never had time to add on to his/her pile of responsibilities.

We expected the Alumni Coordinator to handle roughly 80% of each committee's work load. These tasks related to membership, scholarship, social events, class reunions, fundraising, and writing our newsletters, among others. The concept was simple - hire someone to do much

of the work that was above and beyond what we would expect of any committee chair to do on a voluntary basis. It was a gamble because we had to find ways to fund the position. And even if we could raise the money to fund the position, would the concept even work?

The answer is yes! Laurie Nihiser Fultz, '83 became our very first Alumni Coordinator in 1990, a full 10 years after the Association was created. She probably had the most difficult assignment, simply because she had to blaze the trail. Laurie didn't have a blueprint to follow. We put a lot of faith in Laurie's ability to commit to the job. She had all the skills and personality traits for success. And she was just that - successful. Laurie held the position for three years, until her career no longer offered her the opportunity to continue. Colleen Kretz Gallager, '84, then accepted the position for about another three years. Colleen kept the position on an upward track until we were able to hand off the position to Wendy Brown. After a few years, we felt there was too much turnover to grow at an acceptable rate. Wayne Farinacci, our President who had recently retired from Mayfield High School in 1998, was asked if he would accept the position. Wayne agreed to become the Alumni Coordinator and has held the position for the past 24 years.

After our Alumni Coordinator model became successful, several other alumni associations desired to create something similar. Most didn't turn out so well because they sought funding from their local school board rather than fund the position themselves. Some became obligated to operate like their school board wanted them to. Others couldn't find the right fit. While still others couldn't afford to maintain the position. Perhaps it worked in Mayfield because our alums never give up, never surrender. They supported every event our Alumni Association conducted, including the fundraisers. Our alums fully support one of the strongest scholarship programs in the state of Ohio, which allows our typical fundraising to be used for other student, faculty, and support group endeavors. So there you have it. Our Alumni Coordinator position has helped us become one of the strongest Alumni Associations in the state of Ohio due to the commitment of our alums.

Each future issue of *The Alumni Voice* will feature another unique aspect of the Mayfield Alumni Association.



Two New Scholarships To Be Offered This Year

Once again, our alums have offered to initiate new scholarships starting with the **Class of '23.** The Alumni Association can't thank the alums and their families enough for their desire to offer today's students a better opportunity for success as they head off to college or pursue a skilled trade. Following are the criteria for two new scholarships that will be offered to this year's senior class.

The Emily and Arch McCartney Family Scholarship is awarded to a student in the amount of \$1,000 who will be attending a state university within Ohio. This scholarship is unique in that it will be renewed for three additional years provided the student maintains a 3.0 GPA and continues to attend a state university. Emily McCartney was a long-standing member of the Mayfield Board of Education. Arch McCartney attended Miami University and was a local small business owner. All three sons attended Mayfield H. S., Michael '84, Andrew '88, and James '89. Funding was initiated by The McCartney Family.

The Marella Family Student-Athlete Engineering Scholarship is awarded to a student-athlete in the amount of \$500 who has demonstrated an aptitude in

both a mathematics & science curriculum and in athletics. The student's desire is to pursue a career in engineering or applied sciences. This scholarship is sponsored by the Marella Family graduates of Mayfield H. S. Nancy Fiore Marella, '67, Nico, '21, Mai Ly, '23, and Gianni, '25.

The Mayfield Alumni Association now offers 34 different scholarships to graduating seniors, totaling over \$35,000 each year. Scholarships are awarded during the Honors Day Assembly held every May in the high school auditorium. Alums of all ages continue to donate to their favorite scholarship as a way to signify their admiration for what Mayfield has provided for them many The Association can't thank our donors enough for helping today's students get a head start on their college education or technical training. Preschool Readers Program is a Blast



2022 Mayfield High School Alumni



Daryl Sanders, '59



Mr. Sanders was raised through the eighth grade in the inner city of Cleveland before attending Mayfield High School. Following his professional football career, Mr. Sanders became a corporate executive at age 28, a Cadillac dealer at 35, and founded a church at 44. Currently, Mr. Sanders owns Internet Dealer Solutions, a marketing business focused on helping auto dealers with Internet sales.

He has made numerous missionary trips, traveling to the Ukraine 13 times as well as Russia, Europe, Africa, Mexico, China, and Japan. He also worked extensively with inner city ministries in Columbus, Ohio.

An avid student of the Bible, Mr. Sanders has spoken to tens of thousands of people in America and abroad. He became a well known advocate for the poor and disadvantaged, and has written eight Christian-based books and one business book. He also founded the Church's One Foundation which comprises suburban and inner city churches working together to help the poor and disadvantaged in Central Ohio. Mr. Sanders has worked under Pastor Rod Parsley as the Director of the World Harvest Ministerial Fellowship. From humble beginnings to Mayfield High, Mr. Sanders clearly used his great leadership and potential to succeed, professionally, personally, and globally.



Hester Peirce, '88

Before Yale Law School, and after graduating Phi Beta Kappa from Case Western Reserve University, **Hester Peirce** was a Fulbright Scholar studying in Vienna, Austria. Ms. Peirce's JD from Yale Law took her to an illustrious career as counsel for various committees and organizations, such as the U.S. Senate Committee on Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs, using her expertise in economics and law. Eventually, Ms. Peirce worked her way to her current position as the Commissioner of the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission.

In addition to her prestigious role, Ms. Peirce has published numerous articles and academic papers, as well as books intended to keep consumers protected and informed. She has testified as an expert to the United States Senate and House of Representatives and has advised the public through her op-eds and blogs. Ms. Peirce also served as an adjunct professor at George Mason University Law School.

Running track and cross country at Mayfield gave Hester Peirce "confidence to take on many other challenges in my personal and professional life," she says. "The life lessons impressed on me from my years at Mayfield have helped to shape my career trajectory, which led to my nomination and confirmation to serve as a Commissioner at the Securities and Exchange Commission."

Hester Peirce admits that high school was not easy, but the ethic of hard work and facing challenges head-on was fostered at Mayfield High School. Hall of Fame Inductees



Anne Hu, '05

Anne Hu graduated from Mayfield High School in 2005 and quickly set the path for a successful career in the film industry as an award-winning film editor, producer, and director. The films on which she has worked have been shown in theaters, on television, and streamed internationally. Miss Hu's film work appears on platforms like Netflix, Starz, and AMC.

Graduating The Ohio State University with a marketing and art degree, Anne Hu moved to New York City to work in advertising, all the while nurturing her passion for film and story telling. She landed a job with HBO to edit movie trailers. Combined with her film classes at OSU and working at HBO, Miss Hu was able to conceive, nurture and develop her talents as a filmmaker.

In her own words Miss Hu considers herself "a director and editor, pushing the boundaries of video and story telling." She has contributed to such high profile projects as Game of Thrones, The Walking Dead, Big Little Lies, and Halt and Catch Fire. She has written, directed and edited her own film projects, such as Into the Woods (2015). Anne Hu has been awarded numerous prizes from many diverse film festivals and juries for her writing, directing, editing and acting in Cake (2017). Most recently, she continues post-production on her latest project, Lunchbox, some of which was filmed here at Mayfield High School, as well as a feature film, Mother.

The film community has revered Miss Hu's work. A recent Washington Post article says of Hu's work on and in *Cake*, "Based on the strength of her short film, Hu just might become the latest cinematic force to be reckoned with." Non-profit group Filmshop, which provides peer support for film creators, said of Hu, "...she can provide catharsis for audiences as well as inspire them to regard marginalized voices with their whole humanity."

John Steadman Award



Jim Mormino, '94

Jim Mormino is a 1994 graduate of Mayfield High School and one of the best all-around athletes in Mayfield High School history. A quarterback for the Wildcat football team, Jim was a three-time letterman, an All-Greater Cleveland Conference selection, a News-Herald All-Star, and a member of the All-District team. On the basketball court, Jim earned a varsity letter two times, while being named to the All-GCC team in one of the top basketball conferences in the state. In the spring, Mo displayed a unique combination of speed, strength, and endurance on the Mayfield Track & Field team. He frequently ran the 400 M Dash, the 800 M run, and threw the shot put. In the rarest of feats, Jim won the 800 M run and the shot put in the same meet. Jim was a four-time letter winner in track, he was the Greater Cleveland Conference champion in the 400, the shot put, and the 800 twice.

Jim continued his athletic career at Allegheny College, where he was a running back on the football team and ran both indoor and outdoor track. He earned 9 varsity letters at Allegheny, was all-conference in football three times, including the conference player of the year as a senior, and was a finalist for the Gagliardi Award, the equivalent of the Division III Heisman Trophy. If this success was not enough, Mo was a three-time conference champion in track and field, including breaking the decathlon record, which he still holds today. He was a national qualifier in the decathlon, finishing in 9th place.

Always a Wildcat, Jim returned to Mayfield where he coached football, basketball, and track, before going to Willoughby South where he coached football, and track, and served as athletic director. Jim recently left education to run the family business, Lyndhurst Lumber.
